Seasonal terrarium kit

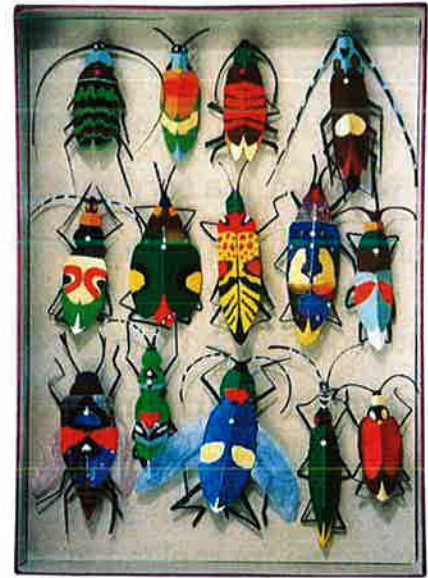
This makes for a fun and interactive centerpiece. Students can donate seasonally appropriate props. Fun for the whole family!

Little bug collection

Students paint 4 pieces of paper each with one color but different patterns. Each layer of the bug is done with different shapes. Stacked, folded in half and pinned through the center. Students name their bug, species written underneath. Bugs are placed in a shadow box. Taxidermy folk art at its sweetest!



Colab art poster



Divide a fine art poster (you can find these inexpensively at art.com) or large photograph into the same number of equal-sized sections as you have students. (If the numbers don't work out exactly right, consider having the teacher, principal or other school "celebrities" create a section, too.) Carefully cut the poster into separate pieces.

Colorful bouquet

Each student makes a watercolor flower with stem. Cut out and arrange in a vase using sewing pins for a slightly raised and layered effect. Using a shadow box will help to create great depth.

Class quilt

Each student chooses fabric scraps to create their own quilt block. The example shows students names under their quilt block but I think it would work better in the lives without.
